Olathe Community Orchestra's Annual Scholarship Concert to Feature Pianist

For the first time in its 38+ seasons, the Olathe Community Orchestra will feature a pianist on its Annual Scholarship Concert! Celes Kramer, a sophomore at Olathe North High School, was selected as this year's High School Scholarship winner. Celes will perform the Rondo movement from *Concerto in G, Op. 73*, by Hummel.

The OCO holds auditions each year for the scholarship concert. High school musicians compete for a \$300 scholarship and the opportunity to perform on the orchestra's final concert of the season. This year's concert will be held on Sunday, April 28, 2024, 3:00 pm, at Grace United Methodist Church, 11485 S. Ridgeview Rd, Olathe, KS 66061. Admission is free; reception at intermission.

In addition to the Hummel *Concerto in G: Rondo*, the program will include *American Salute* by Morton Gould, *The Hebrides Overture* by Felix Mendelssohn, *Rosamunde Overture* by Franz Schubert, and *Academic Festival Overture* by Johannes Brahms. For more information:

Youth Orchestras Offer Unique and Fun Educational Performing Opportunities for Young Flutists

The ensemble experience for most American flutists happens through school band programs. Yet, professional flutists perform mainly in orchestras and other ensembles where they work with string players. Playing in ensembles with string instruments is a very different experience from band. For one thing, orchestral winds play one on a part, as opposed to several winds sharing the same part in band. This allows players to hear more keenly how their parts fit with other instruments; it also hones their listening and intonation skills.

Plus, orchestra music is fun! It is often challenging but also rewarding getting to play music by the masters, i.e. Beethoven, Mozart, Mendelssohn, and more. Playing in an orchestra – including the school musical pit orchestra – is a great way for student musicians to expand their horizons and improve their skills. If you're interested in playing in an orchestra, consider auditioning for the Olathe Youth Symphony or Youth Symphony of KC. Both groups are taking audition applications this month; audition video recordings are due in May. For more information, see p. 2 of this newsletter.

Composer of the Month

Ellen Taaffe Zwilich

b. April 30, 1939



American composer Ellen

Taaffe Zwilich was the first female composer to win the Pulitzer Prize for music and the first occupant of the Composer's Chair at Carnegie Hall. During her tenure at Carnegie Hall, she created the "Making Music" concert series, focusing on lectures and performances by living composers. Born in Miami, FL, Zwilich earned her bachelor's degree in music at Florida State University; she later enrolled in the Juilliard School where she became the first woman to earn the degree of Doctor of Musical Arts in composition. Her works include five symphonies for orchestra and Symphony for Winds (1989), as well as several concertos for solo instruments, including the *Flute Concerto* (No. 1, 1989).
